n a cold January morning, eight seniors and two sponsors from Battle Creek Academy started a trek to Houston, Texas. This group of students has always wanted a senior trip that was mission minded. Several class meetings were spent debating where to go, and then Hurricane Harvey made the choice for them. According to senior, Joel Williams, "The opportunity to help people, *really* help people was compelling. Instead of making class trip an inherently selfish venture, I wanted to reach the unreached and touch the untouched. Rebuilding Little Cambodia was exactly that."

The project, based in Rosharon, Texas, came about after a conversation with

Pastor Chad Bernard and with the help of Michigan's Adventist Community Services department. Our hosts in Texas were the Metropolitan Seventh-day Adventist Church in Missouri City, Texas. These kind folks shared their homes with us, and cooked several delicious meals.

After we arrived in Texas, our project manager, Shane Perry (Rebuild South Texas Ministries) met with us to brief us on our mission. He told the story of the little boy wandering on the beach filled with thousands of stranded starfish. He picked up one at a time and tossed them back into the ocean. An older man just laughed at the boy, taunting him saying he couldn't really make a difference. The boy picked up another and tossed it into

As A Witness

love listening to Strong Tower Radio, whether at home or while driving down the road. They have such uplifting and inspiring programs. One of my favorites begins with . . . "Hey, Mom, Dad, come on, Your Story Hour's on!" Every time I hear those familiar words, fond memories take me back to when I was a child. My family would gather around the tape recorder, eagerly listening to every word of these exciting stories. Years later, my wife and I carried on this tradition with our own children, and they too listened intently to each character-building story. We were never disappointed, as each program spoke to our hearts and challenged us to grow closer to Jesus.

I have those same emotions when I think about camp meeting. Years of wonderful memories flood my mind as I recall the expectation of the first meeting, the sermons, the seminars, and the special sense of God's presence at the ordination and commissioning services. There was also the joy of reconnecting with friends, meeting the speakers, early morning worship, and so much more. Camp meeting is also the time when conference leaders prayerfully cast the vision for the upcoming year and share goals with members from around the conference.

Several years ago, we embraced a method of proclaiming the everlasting gospel based on Jesus' parable of the sower. Sharing the gospel is not a one-time event but rather a lifestyle of both witness and profession - we call it *Grow Michigan*.

At last year's camp meeting, we announced and promoted the statewide Bible study initiative that would enhance our efforts to win souls to Christ within Michigan. *BibleStudyOffer.com* has been a tremendous blessing as thousands have requested Bible studies through this platform. These interests have been channeled to the local churches.

We see members increasingly more engaged and active in their soul-winning efforts, and God is certainly blessing through not only *BibleStudyOffer.com* but our public evangelism initiative, *Unlock Revelation*, as well.

Currently, we have received close to 5,300 Bible study requests through *BibleStudyOffer.com*. And approximately 2,750 of those requests are actively receiving Bible studies through church members. As a result of this amazing evangelistic outreach, 56 individuals have been baptized so far.

God also continues to bless through the *Unlock Revelation* series. Over 2,500 non-Adventists attended this statewide public evangelistic series, with 8,108 total attendees, including local members, who also benefit from hearing the message again. Approximately 460 attendees

have responded to a call for baptism, with many more who are still attending church services or follow-up meetings.

We praise God for each interest. In the past, there was a great need to generate Bible study contacts. Now, we are encountering a new challenge. We need more members who are prepared and willing to follow up each new interest that comes in. Today, we have over 700 individuals who are waiting to be contacted, and that number continues to grow daily.

This great need for member participation was the inspiration behind choosing our camp meeting theme, "As a Witness." In the words of Jesus: "This gospel of the kingdom will be preached in all the world *as a witness*, and *then* the end will come" (Matthew 24:14). Each and every one of us are called to be witnesses for Christ. This is the ultimate purpose for every Seventh-day Adventist.

As a result of this great need, our special focus at camp meeting will be on equipping and training members to become successful soul-winners. We have invited Amazing Facts and their college of evangelism (AFCOE) to partner with our Personal Ministries Department and Emmanuel Institute to provide training for church and personal ministries leaders. Once trained, they can then reproduce this training at the local church level. We pray this will be a blessing because not only will church leaders receive training, but they will also reinforce the principles they learn by teaching members in their local churches. Although the training will be directed toward the local leaders, we are encouraging everyone who is willing to attend the sessions and receive training. Normally there is a \$25 charge for materials but the Michigan Conference is willing to invest that cost in all those who preregister. All are encouraged to attend these training sessions but only

those who preregister will receive materials at no cost. We invite you to preregister through the forms included in this Memo, or online beginning March 1 at misda.org.

In addition to camp meeting, we have many other exciting training and evangelistic events designed to complete the work here in Michigan. The Personal Ministries Department, in partnership with Emmanuel Institute, has already held several training sessions and has scheduled additional district-wide training in Grand Rapids (April 20-28), Berrien Springs (September 21-29), and Saginaw (October 5-13). A *Grow Michigan* training weekend is also scheduled at Camp Au Sable (November 9-11).

You will be pleased with the list of seminars our department directors have put together to inspire, train, and encourage all of us. There will be a seminar on parenting presented by Tom and Elaine Waters, a seminar on marriage by John and Angela Lomacang, and one on music by Christian Berdahl. Adventist-Layman Services and Industries (ASI) will address witnessing in the work place. Adventist Risk Management will speak about a very important topic that has not been addressed before: keeping our churches safe, and will answer the question, are guns an option? These are only a few of the many seminars that are planned and will address a wide range of topics. Keep checking our website to

review the full list of seminars after it is posted.

Our main speaker for the first Sabbath morning through Tuesday night is Ron Kelly, the Senior Pastor of the Village SDA church in Berrien Springs. Last summer he spoke at the Upper Peninsula camp meeting and his message was so relevant and timely that we invited him to come and share the same message at our Cedar Lake camp meeting. Mark Howard will have an early morning worship focused on strengthening our personal relationship with Jesus. In the mid-morning meetings, John Lomacang will share a special series on "Unclean Spirits." And Doug Batchelor will begin speaking on Wednesday night and continue through the last Sabbath. He will also join in teaching the special training session with AFCOE that I referred to earlier.

We recognize that not everyone will be able to stay on the campgrounds due to limited accommodations. We invite all those who are not able to join us in person to join us by way of live streaming as we broadcast these inspiring messages. Our Audio Visual department will also make recordings available through the ABC.

In the parting words of Jesus found in Acts 1:8, He stated that we would "receive power" with the reception of the Holy Spirit. The call is then made for us to "be witnesses... to the end of the earth."

It is no coincidence that the doctrine of the Holy Spirit has come under attack at the very time we need Him most. Without the Spirit, we are devoid of the very power necessary to be witnesses in taking the everlasting gospel to the world.

We pray that camp meeting will be a spiritual blessing to all of us and I invite everyone to prayerfully consider participating in this evangelistic training outreach by responding with these words: "Here am I Lord, send me."

the ocean responding, "For that ONE I made a difference."

That was our purpose—to make a difference for one person. Class president Logan Bateman stated, "After the trip, I felt that I, along with my classmates, had made a difference in the area that we served. No lesson would have been learned if we had just gone to have fun."

Our project was based in the Cambodian community in Rosharon, a Buddhist community that was hit hard by Harvey. The community survives on the crops it grows and sells locally. A number of their greenhouses were left more tattered than the houses. After Harvey the community worked to rebuild the structures into livable conditions. One house was used for cooking, one for bathing—with the bathtub actually outside—and one toilet for the entire community.

The students worked hard to rehab a fairly large home that will be used to house volunteers over the coming months. This will help with the goal of rebuilding the entire community. Over 3000 volunteers are expected to reside there in the months ahead. Our students worked to bring this house together by hanging sheetrock, learning to mud and tape, sand, trim out windows, and to hang trim. A couple of them worked with another volunteer who was an electrician to restore safe, consistent power to the building.

One student summarized the trip in this way, "Seeing the people on the site that we were helping really made the work worth it. I would in a heartbeat do it again, and this trip in reality has created a desire to go on more mission trips!"



Updated Office Hours Michigan Conference

n our efforts to be more efficient and fiscally responsible, the conference has elected to go with a four-day work week. Prior to this change, the schedule included a half-day on Fridays. In order to compensate for those hours, the office staff will add time to their schedules Monday through Thursday.

In the past, the support staff was also on a flex schedule, where some could come in earlier and leave earlier, or arrive later and work later. We are standardizing the office hours so you can expect the office to be open from 8:00 AM – 5:30 PM (Monday – Thursday).

This move will save the hourly employees the time and expense of coming to work for a half-day on Fridays. It will also bring the Michigan Conference into line with the other conferences of the Lake Union.

Also, please note that department directors are available beyond the stated

office hours to best serve the needs of the Michigan family. You may call them directly or leave a message at their office number, which can be accessed remotely.

The ABC will remain open on Fridays from 8:00 AM – 12:00 PM. Their hours from Monday through Thursday are identical to the regular office hours stated above.
